#### **Deirdre Anderson**

My work is intuitive, and process led. Creatively, my inspiration comes from aspects of the natural world which surrounds me, as well as thought processes and dreams. It is the emotions they give rise to that motivates me to make artwork. I am excited by the infinite possibilities of working with a variety of media, oils, collage, found objects, printmaking, cold wax and encaustics, which when combined or used separately, enable me to respond to these feelings, and keeps me returning to my studio to exploit their future promise. In the piece exhibited here, collaged mixed media, the use of the layered encaustic process adds a fragile dimension.

#### Johanna Ashby

The focus of my work has always been the natural world and my relationship with it. I choose very specifically to exclude human or other animal form, preoccupied by the patterns and rhythms in Nature, from the power of the ocean to the intricacy in the structure of flora. I may include human intervention, such as the pollarding of willows, to describe how Nature has responded and often reclaimed its ground. I frequently use mixed media and acrylic paint, built up in layers of glazes, in an effort to define and re-define space and forms. My work is rooted in observation with drawing under-pinning everything I do.

#### Jamie Ashforth

Jamie Ashforth is a West-Cork based Canadian visual artist researching the relationship between place and material, with a focus on vulnerability, blurriness and experimentation. Her practice is largely process-led and material-responsive out of a quest for embodied experiences of discovery. Jamie is current In-House 2 artist-in- residence at The Guesthouse Project, and a member of Re:Group, an international collective recently exhibiting at the O'Driscoll building in West Cork. While in residence at Uillinn: West Cork Arts Centre this spring, she hosted Groundswell Again, a synchronized transatlantic event generating kindship across distance.

The material in this artwork is 'fused glass' and 'dichroic glass' - which has a wonderful reflective shine. I use glass to create original artworks that are inspired by Nature and the place I am in. West Cork is a great inspiration and the seashore has so much to offer to artists.
